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Message from the Board of Directors

The 2009/2010 year has been a vibrant time for QPIRG Concordia. We've continued to grow as an organization at a steady pace; increasing visibility on campus and in the community, incorporating and expanding new projects and programs, strengthening our links between students and community activism, and building our internal structures.

We began the year with a weekend-long board training and a full board of twelve members representing both the student and community experience. Through a variety of trainings over the year, we were acquainted with QPIRG's mandate and operations. As board members, we worked together throughout the year on a multitude of board initiatives and projects, including programming, finances, the resource library, policy development and various hiring committees. We have continued to build upon the strong policies put forth by former boards.

We had many exciting programming highlights on campus this year including *DisOrientation* - QPIRG's "Alternative" Orientation program; *Study in Action* - an undergraduate research conference on social and environmental justice; *Keeping It Reel* - QPIRG's monthly Subversive Cinema series; *Activism 101 for Students* workshops; skillshares and more. Our presence grew on campus with the success of the campaign to include graduate students as fee-paying members, solidifying our long-time relationship with the graduate student community. We continue to build the *Community-University Research Exchange* (CURE) program, connecting community research needs with students doing research for their courses. The QPIRG space has undergone exciting changes as we renovated our office and increased our visibility from the street.

In June, QPIRG Concordia like many other groups was rocked by the brutality of the police response at the G20 in Toronto. During this time, one of our own employees was taken into custody and now faces archaic and restrictive conditions. We continue to extend our support to this employee as well as all the other G20 arrestees in the face of ongoing state repression. Despite this being a very difficult time, the board was brought closer in its ability to effectively respond to this situation.

We thank our summer program coordinators who worked diligently on developing new and exciting initiatives such as School Schmool, the Queer Zine Archive Project and the *Convergence* undergraduate journal - we continue to thrive on the unique and engaging projects that members share with us. We thank our dedicated part-time coordinators Siji and Hokuto who worked throughout the year to strengthen the QPIRG programs CURE and the alternative resource library respectively. Much of QPIRG Concordia's strength lies in the hard work and determination of our returning staff members: Ashley, our administration coordinator, Jaggi, our working groups coordinator, and Tasha, our finance coordinator. They are supported by the technical expertise of Jessica, our bookkeeper, and Amir, our computer technician.

Along with our new and returning working groups, affiliate groups and solidarity groups we hope to continue to grow and gain greater awareness on campus and in our surrounding communities. We'd like to thank everyone for their perseverance through this dynamic year. We plan to continue onward as a strong social and environmental justice outlet both on campus and in the community.

QPIRG Mandate

The Quebec Public Interest Research Group at Concordia is a resource centre for student and community research and organizing. We strive to raise awareness and support grassroots activism around diverse social and environmental justice issues. Our work is rooted in an anti-oppression analysis and practice. We seek to make campus-community links and inspire social change through engaging, inclusive and non-hierarchical approaches.

QPIRG Concordia is committed to being inclusive and accessible to all. We are actively opposed to all forms of discrimination and oppression. QPIRG is a volunteerdriven, student funded, non-profit organization that is independent from the Concordia administration and student union. Both students and community members are welcome to make use of our space and resources as well as participate in QPIRG projects.

QPIRG History

The first Public Interest Research Group (PIRG) was established in 1970. Since then, PIRGs continue to emerge across the continent as university student groups. Historically, the PIRGs' mandate has been to provide a structure within which students and community members can develop the knowledge and practical skills needed in activism and community work. By providing a forum and training ground for people to be engaged community participants, the PIRGs complement the academic structure by linking theory and practice. All PIRGs are directed by a volunteer board of directors composed of students and other community members. The diversity among PIRGs reflects the diversity of its membership and volunteer board.

At Concordia, QPIRG started as a student club funded by the Concordia Student Union in 1981. Its popularity grew until a referendum in 1989 determined that QPIRG would be independent and funded by a student fee levy. Today, paid staff members accompany the volunteers who help keep QPIRG running. Over the years, QPIRG Concordia has expanded its mandate and projects to include a wide range of community activism and research. We encourage students to benefit from QPIRG and create QPIRG working groups, apply for funding for projects and research, and learn skills by volunteering for events, projects, or the board of directors.

QPIRG Structure

As of the fall 2007, all undergraduate students at Concordia are automatically members of QPIRG and are entitled to all of QPIRG services by virtue of their 0.31\$ per credit fully refundable fee. As of September 2010, all graduate students at Concordia are automatically members by virtue of their \$0.50 per semester fully refundable fee levy. Community members are eligible for membership after completing 10 hours of volunteer work at QPIRG or by paying their fully refundable annual fee equivalent to 3 credits per semester.

Board of Directors:

At QPIRG, the Board of Directors plays an integral part within the organization. With regular meetings and active participation in all aspects of QPIRG, board members set the organization's agenda and direction, sit on organizing committees and support the staff. Members gain valuable experience and training in anti-oppression, financial management, policy development, labour-management relations, community organizing, project development and programming, and consensus building. A new board is elected by the membership during the fall semester at QPIRG's Annual General Meeting (AGM), although new Board members can be appointed during the year upon consensus of the current board in the event that a vacant spot arises.

Staff:

For the year 2009-2010, QPIRG Concordia employed 3 permanent staff members, who collectively worked to facilitate the day-to-day operations and coordinate long-term planning and training of the Board.

Our permanent staff people in 2009-2010 were: **Ashley Fortier**, Administration Coordinator **Jaggi Singh**, Working Group and Programming Coordinator **Tasha Zamudio**, Finance Coordinator

In the fall of 2009, we welcomed **Siji Kompanal** as our current part-time Outreach and Promotions coordinator focusing on the Community University Research Exchange (CURE) at Concordia University. We also welcomed **Hokuto Sugano** as a part-time coordinator of QPIRG's Alternative Resource Library for the Fall and Winter semesters of 2009-2010. We look forward to working with **Rebecca Carson**, who joined us in September 2010 as our new library coordinator. Their positions are supported partially by Concordia's Financial Aid and Awards Office work-study program.

In May 2010, **Julia De Montigny** joined the QPIRG team as our summer Alternative Resource Publication coordinator, working on the School Schmool Alternative Agenda in partnership with QPIRG McGill, and the QPIRG Concordia Poster Archive Project. Our summer team also included **Kat Butler** and **Emma Russell**, two summer stipend recipients who worked together on the "Queers Made This" queer organizing archive zine, and **Derek Lappano**, another summer stipend recipient who worked on establishing "Convergence," an undergraduate journal for Study In Action and CURE.

QPIRG was supported by an external bookkeeper, **Jessica Charest**, a member of the Concordia community. In addition, QPIRG systems received the support of our network administrator and computer technician, **Amir Al-Shourbaji**, whose services we've retained since August 2005.

"Concordia University, its students and faculty, are blessed with the active presence of QPIRG. QPIRG Committee Reports:

Resource Library Committee

QPIRG Concordia's resource library is an ongoing core project that has continued to grow at a steady pace in the past year. Our library has more than eight hundred titles of books, films, magazines, and zines on a wide range of social justice and environmental justice issues, which are available to students and community members to borrow for up to two weeks at a time. In addition to this collection, our library holdings are listed on an alternative libraries online database alongside thousands of other titles from different Montreal-based resource centers with similar mandates to our own. In the past year, three new libraries applied and were accepted to join this database: the Centre for Community Organizations, the Sexual Assault Centre of the McGill Students Society and the Quebec Public Interest Research Group at UQAM.

In the fall 2009 and winter 2010 semesters, we welcomed Hokuto Sugano as our work-study library coordinator. Hokuto, along with a committee of board members and volunteers, worked hard to maintain the day-to-day operations of the library, shelving books, helping members find and sign out resources, registering new members, recalling overdue resources, and purchasing new items for the library. In addition to this day-to-day work, larger infrastructural changes were also made to make the library more user-friendly. A new website was launched for our library, making it possible for members to sign up for a membership, suggest new resources, check what resources are available in the library, and sign out resources all with the click of a few buttons online. This shift to an electronic circulation system is in its last stages and our new work-study library coordinator, Rebecca Carson, will be working throughout the next few months to effectively institute and train members on its use. The resource library added a large number of very exciting new resources this year, many of which are featured on the homepage of the new library website!

Policy Committee

This year's policy committee consisted of several board members and one staff member. This year, the committee focused on a full revamp of an outdated employee evaluations policy, which is its final stages and ready to be adopted by the incoming Board of Directors. Other policy priorities that have been identified throughout the year include the development of a comprehensive hiring policy, writing an updated finance policy, and amending the employment policy to account for what to do when employees are held in detention.

In addition to working on QPIRG's internal policies, meetings took place amongst staff and board members at QPIRGs McGill and Concordia and the 2110 Centre for Gender Advocacy, as part of a **Policy Bank** initiative. The Policy Bank aims to collectively develop policy drafts for shared needs identified by these three organizations. The main focus of this project in the past year was to develop a hiring policy draft to be then brought back to each respective organization for adaptation and adoption, a task which is about to be completed. The second thing Policy Bank took on more recently was a review of the current Conflict Resolution and Complaints policy which each of these groups share, to consider changes to the policy based on its first application this past year. This latter task is ongoing and will likely make up the focus of Policy Bank for the next few months.

Finance Committee:

This committee's mandate is to give direction to financial decisions, advise the board on financial matters, develop transparent and accessible financial practices, and maintain a more in-depth understanding of QPIRG's financial position than is possible at the general board level. The finance committee, comprised of three board members and a staff person, met regularly to provide board representatives with an opportunity to develop an in-depth understanding of the internal financial systems of QPIRG and its financial position. The committee met throughout the year to comb through financial statements on behalf of the board, discuss financial issues and proposals. The committee facilitated the budget setting and mid-year budget review processes. The committee successfully proposed the changing of the fiscal year end from August 31st to October 31st to better suit QPIRG's financial calendar, and oversaw the successful completion of two 3rd party financial audits by a Chartered Accountant.

Staff Liaison Committee:

The staff liaison committee plays a crucial role in maintaining good communications between staff and board. This work is a less visible but integral part of board contributions to QPIRG. Three board members sat on this committee throughout the year and took on tasks such as staff check-ins, monitoring staff overtime, and generally maintaining positive relations between employees and the employer. This year, the committee provided additional support for the staff when the QPIRG community faced unforeseen difficulties, including when a member of our staff was temporarily detained in relation to G20 protests. The committee also initiated various acts of staff appreciation and helped with the development of the staff evaluation policy.

Programming at QPIRG Concordia 2009-2010:

Building on the organizing of previous years, programming at QPIRG Concordia aims to provide a space to accommodate new student activists who might be curious about social justice issues but not yet directly involved, as well as to deepen our understanding and skills as activists and organizers.

Importantly, this year QPIRG Concordia initiated monthly Activism for Students 101 workshops. These sessions were meant for anyone who is curious or interested in getting more involved in their community and engaging in social and environmental justice issues, while providing an understanding of QPIRG's antioppression, grassroots organizing framework. We hosted seven monthly sessions this year, and will continue with these successful workshops into 2010-2011.

QPIRG also continued the "Keeping It Reel Film Series," a monthly event in the H-110 auditorium, with eight film screenings organized in collaboration with our working groups and allies. Each screening attracts a large audience and helps to build awareness of a wide array of social justice issues. Another way of reaching people curious about social justice organizing was our "QPIRG 101" series which this year tackled various social justice topics – racism, capitalism, ecology – in an accessible way, meant for people new to or curious about these issues and concepts. We hosted two QPIRG 101s this year.

Another important aspect of QPIRG programming were our skillshares, meant to deepen knowledge and skills amongst students and activists. This year we provided four skillshare events, as well as supporting our working groups who regularly offer workshops and educational events.

This year we also initiated an event called "New Year's Revolution," a daylong series of events comprising an Open House, a CURE "5 à 7" and a Walking Tour. The Walking Tour, as well as a popular Community-Campus Bike Tour, also became a regular part of our programming.

We actively supported conferences and week-long events including: Indigenous Sovereignty Week (October 2009), the Forum Against Police Violence and Impunity (January 2010), Israeli Apartheid Week (March 2010), Got Your Back: A Forum on Radical Support (September 2010), Concordia Eats – Sustainable Food Fair (September 2010), and others.

Co-Sponsorships (Discretionary Funding):

In addition to working group budgets, every fiscal year, QPIRG creates a discretionary fund that is open to student and community initiatives that promote social justice in a variety of formats, from conferences and guest speakers, to demonstrations and radical art projects. This discretionary fund is accessed by making an application to the Board of Directors for co-sponsorship. The standard application form is accessible on the website: www.qpirgconcordia.org. Groups whose initiatives fall within the parameters of QPIRG's mandate generally receive between \$50 to \$250 per application and, if a group has more than one initiative throughout the year, it can re-apply for co-sponsorship as new ideas take root. From October 2009 to October 2010, the Board of Directors made discretionary decisions usually every other week, allocating roughly \$250 per session.

Study In Action - An Undergraduate Conference Linking Students with Community Activism :

The fourth annual Study In Action Conference, presented by QPIRG Concordia, was held at Concordia University in Montreal on March 12th, 13th and 14th, 2010. The aim of the conference was to provide an opportunity for students and people outside the academic community to come together to work on and discuss approaches to social and environmental justice, while creating a forum to highlight undergraduate research. This year, the conference took a closer look at environmental justice and where social and environmental issues meet.

Building upon the strengths of previous years, the conference was a great success with our biggest year ever. Over the course of three days, there were: 19 undergraduate paper and community group presentations; 3 key events (an opening keynote panel, a post-keynote social event and a 2-day conference); 7 undergraduate visual art installations; over 350 student and community member participants; student participants from all four of the major Montreal universities, and also from across Canada including Dalhousie University, Ryerson University and University of Waterloo.

The conference began with an opening keynote panel, where panelists were invited to speak to their thoughts, experiences and research regarding environmental justice, positing the question of how to move "beyond sustainability and towards environmental justice." The panelists were; **Gord Hill**, Indigeneous artist and activist, author of 500 Years of Indigenous Resistance; **Sharmeen Khan**, environmental justice and anti-racist activist, writer, and researcher; **Poya Saffari**: farmer and activist with *le Coop jardins de la résistance*; **Catherine St-Arnaud-Babin**: queer feminist activist and member of *Collectif de recherche sur l'autonomie collective* (CRAC) at Concordia University. The post-keynote social event took place at QPIRG Concordia, where conference participants had the opportunity to speak informally with panelists over food and beverages.

Feedback from the conference panelists, presenters and participants was overwhelmingly positive. A photo essay is available on the Study In Action website along with a full schedule of events, information on student and community group presenters, and details about the art installations. The Study In Action organizing committee, with the support of QPIRG Concordia staff, has already begun planning for next year's conference, with many new ideas on how to make Study In Action even more effective in connecting undergraduate studies with community engagement.

Community University Research Exchange (CURE):

The past year was by far the most successful year for the Community-University Research Exchange (CURE) since its inception in 2007. CURE's mission is to facilitate community-directed research collaborations between Montreal university students and grassroots community groups who work on environmental and social justice issues. This past academic year, CURE was able meet its mandate to a greater extent than ever before.

Its accomplishments are numerous: CURE facilitated more student researchers participating in CURE projects than ever before; over twenty new projects have been added to the CURE database; community outreach expanded to now include well over 300 grassroots organizations; numerous improvements to the CURE website have been made including the implementation of forms that facilitate the application process for both students and community groups.

Several CURE projects were highlighted this year in the new CONVERGENCE undergraduate research journal, as well as at the annual Study in Action conference.

Importantly, this year CURE hosted four popular "5 à 7" events at QPIRG Concordia – during "Old School/New School" (September 2009), "New Year's Revolution" (January 2010), "CURE Final" (April 2010), and again at "DisOrientation" (September 2010) -- where interested students met with community group representatives and heard professors speak to the importance of research for social transformation.

This year, CURE was coordinated by Concordia student Siji Kompanal, with the support of a CURE committee of board members and staff. CURE continues to be joint initiative of QPIRG Concordia and QPIRG McGill.

Alternative Orientation:

This year's Alternative Orientation program, DisOrientation, took place from September 20–24, 2010 and was an enormous success. The schedule was jampacked, the events were all popular and the feedback from the week was very positive. More than six hundred people participated throughout the five days of programming, which took place on or close to the downtown Concordia campus. Events included workshops, panel discussions, a campus-community tabling fair, a bike tour, a radical walking tour, and a closing fundraiser party. The content of the week represented a wide range of the topics and issues at the heart of QPIRG Concordia's social and environmental justice mandate and offered new and returning students alike an introduction to social and environmental issues as well as a window into the types of events, resources and volunteer opportunities they could access throughout the rest of the year.

One of the highlights of the week was a panel featuring Montreal journalist Meg Hewings and renowned sports commentator Dave Zirin who made his first-ever appearance in Montreal. They discussed "the politics of sports," a topic which drew out a diverse crowd - many of whom had never attended a OPIRG Concordia event before. Other notable events included a second speaking event co-presented with the 2110 Centre for Gender Advocacy, with indigenous youth activists Jessica Yee and Melissa Elliott. Both spoke with great passion and insight about the ongoing impacts of colonialism on their communities and what they were doing to inspire the youth to fight back. The workshops during the week included our monthly "Activism for Students 101" as well as three others hosted by some of our working groups on topics of bottled water, silk-screen printing, and the prison system. The campus and community groups tabling fair offered students an opportunity to learn more about volunteer opportunities and services offered on- and off-campus, and gave witness to the first ever CJLO Radio Concordia and CKUT Radio McGill joint live broadcast, in collaboration with **Concordia University Television** (CUTV). The week drew to a close with an incredibly successful dance party which doubled as a launch for the 2010 School Schmool Agenda and the new QPIRG Concordia poster archive project. The event also featured a "skills auction," the proceeds from which went towards the Prisoner Correspondence Project, one of our long-standing working groups.

The success of the program is also a great testament to the commitment of the tireless volunteers who helped out leading up to and during the week of events.

School Schmool Alternative Agenda:

School Schmool is resource publication that acts as both a practical day-planner and resource publication on social and environmental justice issues and projects. Previously geared towards the McGill campus, after years of consistent popularity amongst Concordia students, this year School Schmool expanded into a joint project between QPIRG McGill and QPIRG Concordia. Two coordinators were hired this summer to realize this project along with a team of volunteers. **Julia de Montigny** (QPIRG Concordia) and **Kim Roos** (QPIRG McGill) were this year's coordinators.

School Schmool began in 1994 as a bi-annual publication out of QPIRG McGill that sought to bring together information, groups, and practical tools of use to all students, but particularly those interested in social justice, equity, and sustainability issues. In the summer of 2006, School Schmool was resurrected as a day planner and progressive resource book.

This year's shiny new edition, developed through the summer of 2010, features a diverse range of articles and group profiles to guide students and others towards a more socially and environmentally just Montreal experience. The year-long calendar provides users with the space to keep track of their lives while the featured historical dates help to archive important moments in Montreal's history. New features include: the inclusion of Concordia University academic dates and more Concordia-based groups, a larger format to accommodate people's busy activist and academic schedules, a moon calendar, thick divider tabs to that make the guide easier to navigate, a small month by month calendar section and extra blank pages at the back for notes and ideas.

School Schmool has received an overwhelming amount of positive feedback from community and campus members for its appealing aesthetic, the featured artwork, its practical layout and its engaging and useful content. With the development of a partnership with QPIRG Concordia, School Schmool 2009-2010 has had its biggest year to date, with a distribution of almost 2,000 copies across the city.

The goal of School Schmool is to encourage students and non-students alike to engage with and participate in the issues affecting them as members of both academic and non-academic communities in Montreal. With more information and resources, School Schmool is connecting individuals and activist projects more than ever before. The project continues to successfully aid School Schmool users to engage with articles, resources and practical tools so that they may participate in social and environmental justice activism and find their place in the city.

Summer Stipend Program:

In May 2010, QPIRG offered a summer stipend program to provide members of the QPIRG Concordia community with a budget/honorarium to work over the summer doing research leading towards action and change within the Montreal community. This year, QPIRG expanded the program to include two summer stipend projects to represent a broader range of campus-community connections.

Stipend 1 – Queer Archive Zine Project

The Queer Archive Zine Project was highly successful, with over two hundred copies of *Crée par des QUEERS Made This: Un recueil d'oeuvres visuelles des luttes queer à Montréal 2005-2010/ A visual archive of queer organizing in Montréal 2005-2010* assembled. Over one hundred copies have already been sold, and many have been issued to volunteers, sponsors, alternative libraries, archives, and contributors. Requests for distribution have been received from Toronto to Vancouver.

The final version of the zine is 8.5" by 11", in full colour, forty pages long, printed on 100% recycled paper, and bound in a silkscreened cover. The layout features slightly more than half of the pages completely filled with high quality scans of posters and flyers from local queer events from the past five years in Montreal, and the rest are made up of textual descriptions of queer groups that have been active in Montréal in that time-span. The content is completely bilingual. The zine was launched alongside a month-long radical queer poster exhibition (many of which were included in the zine) at le Cagibi on August 9th, as part of Pervers/Cité. Feedback from the event was extremely positive, with a turnout of more than a hundred people.

QPIRG Concordia thanks the two stipend coordinators, **Emma Russell** and **Kat Butler**, the Qteam solidarity group who initiated and collaborated on the project, and all the volunteers who contributed to the success of this project.

Stipend 2 – Convergence undergraduate journal

Convergence is a journal of undergraduate research on politics and social justice. Initially developed as a companion journal to QPIRG Concordia's annual *Study in Action* conference on social and environmental justice, Convergence grew to include research papers developed through the Community-University Research Exchange (CURE) and in partnership with the CURE programs at QPIRGs McGill and Concordia – an expansion that opened up the possibility for more diverse content, and strengthened the journal's new purpose to facilitate and affirm the important work done by undergraduate students at both universities.

Convergence brings intellectual labour out of the classroom and into the community, be it through emphasizing political content – discovering alternatives and supporting struggles – or by virtue of its united, physical form that allows such discussions to reach a greater audience and that serves as an accessible reference piece.

This September, the journal was successfully launched alongside a CURE event during QPIRG Concordia's "DisOrientation" week to a packed room of students, community members, and professors. Together, the attendees proved their desire to be part of QPIRG Concordia's commitment to transform academic culture, making it relevant to struggles for justice while also looking to strengthen those movements through critical analysis and important research.

QPIRG Concordia thanks stipend recipient **Derek Lappano** for developing this project and all the many volunteers who contributed to the success of this project.
